The story of their early years together, and of Helen’s remarkable psychological and intellectual growth, is told in *The Story of My Life*, which first appeared in installments in *Ladies’ Home Journal* in 1902. With Anne Sullivan, “Teacher,” at her side, Helen Keller graduated from Radcliffe College in 1904, an extraordinary accomplishment for any woman of her time. Helen was dedicated to helping the blind and handicapped, raising funds for the American Foundation for the Blind and lobbying for commissions for the blind in thirty states.
